iii. 3sing. omission - 'If somebody come up and push me ...'

'She don't like it here ...'

iv. absence of agreement:

'And the people that live here is ...'

'They was like, ...'

'... they __ like, 'you speak a little bit weird'

v. Habitual Be - 'You be doing a classwork in class, ...'

vi. auxiliary omission - 'I ____ been doing dancing ...'

vii. Negative concord - 'I didn't see nothing no more.'

viii. 'they ain't supposed to do that.'

ix. Object deletion - 'I gave him __ to eat.'

x. Quotative go, be like, be all - 'When people wanna fight me I'm like "well okay, ...'

xi. Focuser *like* - 'She was like a real thin lady.'

xii. Resumptive pronouns - 'I know this lady that she used to live here.'

xiii. Question *tell* - 'I told Elinore "Is that your brother?""

xiv. would in if clauses - 'If he'd be here right now, he'd make me laugh.'

xv. could for can - 'Nobody believes that you could fix anything.'

xvi. prepositions - 'We start on July.'
